

Kasper Elm Heintz receives a Carlsberg grant!



DAWN Researcher Kasper Elm Heintz was recently granted the Carlsberg Foundation Reintegration Fellowship in the amount of DKK 1.237.596. Kasper obtained his PhD from the University of Iceland in 2019. He is an excellent scientific author and he has substantial teaching experience from Iceland. He will officially join the DAWN as Post Doc on 01 February 2022.

Kasper's research and project aim to shed light on the origins of fast radio bursts by studying their host galaxy environments, based on an on-going programme at the Very Large Telescope in Chile dedicated to obtain the first homogenous and unbiased sample of their host galaxies. These observations will ultimately help in uncovering the physical nature of these exotic bursts. Read more here.

Award to Claudia Lagos *



Christmas traditions in Denmark

The Danish traditional Christmas activities can seem quite odd to some foreigners. For example, the tradition of **dancing around the Christmas tree on Christmas Eve** while singing Christmas carols.

Another Danish Christmas and December tradition is the candle calendar. This tradition of counting days until Christmas goes all the way back to the beginning of the 19th century. However, it was not until 1942, during the German occupation, that actual candles were produced and sold. These candles resemble a tape measure and have 24 markings representing the days leading up to Christmas. The candles are lit every day from 1st December, quite often at the breakfast table.







Of course for the Danes, the food and sweets are the core items of the Christmas traditions. One example is the 'Julefrokost'/Christmas Lunch parties, where dishes like herring, preserved red cabbage, pork-roast and ris-ala-mande for dessert are enjoyed. Let us not forget the traditional sipping of alcoholic beverage like "snaps" or brandy. © Other famous Christmas desserts are cookies called "Vanilje-kranse (vanilla-wreathes)", "Klejner (crullers)" and 'brunkager (crispy cookies with brown sugar).







Yet one of the most popular Danish Christmas desserts to serve are the 'Æbleskiver'. Directly translated this means apple-slices which are sort of like a doughnut in the texture. The history tells that the 'Æbleskiver' was introduced in Denmark around the 1700's and it used to be slices of apples that were fried in a pan. Later the dough was added to the apple slices and eventually it was only a small piece of apple that was placed in the individual little puff. Today, the apple is not put into the recipes. Æbleskiver are served warm, with powdered sugar and different types of jam on the side with 'jule-glögg', a drink that originated in Sweden. Although 'glögg' can be found in Greece and Germany, it is considered a traditional Scandinavian beverage, and is served warm during the Christmas holiday season. It is usually made from red wine, almonds, sugar, raisins, cardamom, cloves and cinnamon.
